# Why work with a Schiller appointed Partner Agent?

Schiller Partner Agents are selected from among the most reputable Education Agents in each country. They are appointed by a special committee and must sign an agreement in which they agree to providing minimum duties and to adhere to a code of conduct.

## Minimum Schiller Duties include:

- Display and distribute promotional materials.
- Prepare and conduct information seminars.
- Counsel students and provide necessary assistance for enrollment.
- Help students to complete Applications, including collecting applicant credentials and forwarding completed applications to the designated Schiller Admissions Office.
- Ensure that the student pays Schiller directly all applicable fees 14 days prior to the start of term.

## The Code of Conduct includes:

- To act in an ethical and professional manner in all undertakings with international students and their families.
- To provide advice to international students based on instructions and written information as supplied.
- To provide information to international students about life and study in the COUNTRIES where Schiller has campuses.
- To act in good faith so as to not intentionally undermine the good name of any individuals or Schiller as a whole.
- To provide applicants with Schiller payment policy.

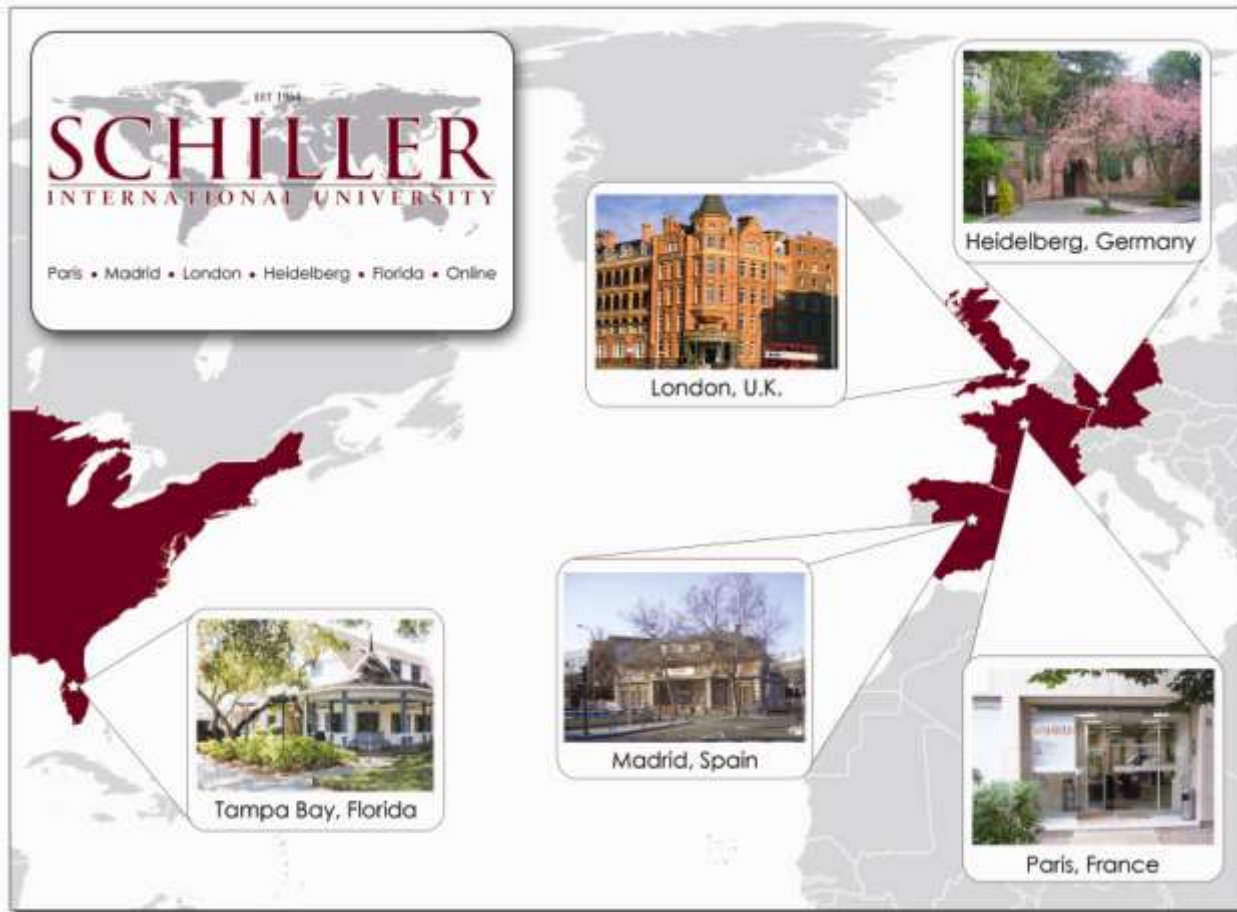

# The Schiller Philosophy of Teaching

- The American degree system which is respected around the world and is taught at all locations plus online.
- National Accreditation from ACICS ([www.acics.org](http://www.acics.org)), highly regarded in the United States for practical qualifications.

## ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

- All new students, graduate and undergraduate, whose native language is not English, and who have not achieved the above TOEFL or IELTS scores in the past 2 years, must take the Schiller English Placement Test to enter their degree program. This can be taken at any of the Schiller campuses where they wish to register and study.
- The Schiller English Placement test score determines whether or not a student will be required to take additional English language instruction. If the test results indicate that the student does not need any more English language instruction, the student will be able to register for their regular university studies.
- Students who are not proficient in English will be enrolled in either intermediate or advanced English language instruction, as indicated by the score on the English Placement Exam. Advanced level English instruction may be taken with other university courses. Total credit hours, however, may not exceed 16.

# Florida 'Work Study Experience' Major – A Special Masters Program Option

- The Work Study Experience Program (WSEP) helps prepare students for leadership roles in today's global environment through hands-on learning along with classroom education, .
- The program offers students an opportunity to learn more about their chosen field, gain on-the-job experience, and make contacts for future full-time employment.
- Work Study Experience positions are paid internships, and students in this program are required to participate in them.
- Students have an excellent opportunity to intern in hotels, tourism agencies, banks, and business, technology, and financial institutions in the Tampa Bay area.
- Many multinational companies look for the expertise and knowledge that international students bring to their companies.
- Whether students plan to work in the USA or in their own country after graduation, the Work Study Experience Program prepares them for unlimited employment opportunities in global companies.

## SPECIAL CONDITIONS APPLY

- The main goal of these internships, set up in direct compliance with US Federal Law, is for students to obtain real work experience during their education process that will reflect well upon their resumes when they enter the work force after obtaining their Masters degree from Schiller.
- WSEP students must provide documented proof of a minimum work experience of two years.
- WSEP is a study program that requires and is based on a student visa; this is **not a work program that is based on a work visa.**
- Schiller holds no control over these paid internships; they are offered in the private sector in the USA; work **cannot** be guaranteed. Federal minimum hourly wage is \$7.25. Earnings **cannot** fully cover tuition; living and major expenses The student must make sure that there is enough money in his/her bank account to cover expenses while living in the USA.
- Good spoken and written English communication skills are required. Schiller will assist students to a reasonable degree in their search for the paid internship directly related to their major field of study.
- An Administrative fee of \$3000 (subject to change) is required in addition to all other fees.
- WSEP students must maintain a minimum grade point average of 3.0 or higher in order to graduate.
- Certain other conditions apply.

## US ‘Work Opportunities’ for International Students on Student Visas

This information cannot be guaranteed. Please check with the appropriate country consulate.

- International students under F-1 visa do NOT have the RIGHT TO WORK in the US while studying.
- Curriculum Practical Training Program (CPT) - Students with an F-1 visa, enrolled full-time for a minimum of 9 months consecutive study, may apply to work through the CPT program. CPT can be paid or unpaid part-time (20 hours or less per week) or full-time (over 20 hours per week), and must be in the student’s field of study, however if a student is using CPT full-time for more than 12 months they will lose their OPT. For the Schiller ‘Work Study Experience Major’ for graduate Executive MBA programs the student may start work immediately. Special conditions apply and CPT must be approved by the student’s Academic Advisor and the DSO.
- Optional Practical Training (OPT) - Students with an F-1 visa, are eligible to apply for OPT after graduation if they have maintained their Immigration student status and have not engaged in more than 12 months of full-time CPT internship. OPT must be in the student’s field of study. OPT is valid for 12 months. Students must find and secure a job within 3 months after receipt of approval.

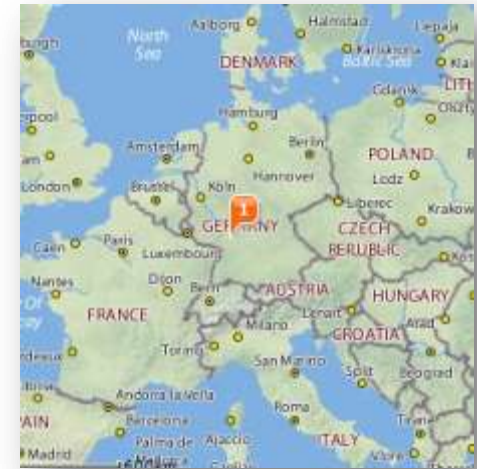

## Germany ‘Work Opportunities’ for International Students on Student Visas

This information cannot be guaranteed. Please check with the appropriate country consulate.

- **From original EU countries:** Students may work in Germany; no student entry visa is required. Will require a ‘FREIZÜGIGKEITSBESCHEINIGUNG’ in their passport issued by the local Foreign Office.
- **From new EU countries:** Students may work in Germany for 90 whole days or 180 half days per year; no student entry visa is required. Will require a ‘FREIZÜGIGKEITSBESCHEINIGUNG’ in their passport issued by the local Foreign Office.
- **From the USA, Canada & Japan:** Students may work in Germany for 90 whole days or 180 half days per year; no student entry visa is required. Must apply for a residence permit once they are in Germany.
- **From all other countries:** Students may work in Germany for 90 whole days or 180 half days per year; Students need a student visa for entry, this must be converted to a residence permit once they arrive. An additional **WORK PERMIT** (issued by the Labor Office) is required for any work beyond the 90 days.
- **After graduation:** Students may apply while in Germany for a "looking for work residency". They must show proof of graduation and the financial means to live in Germany while they look for work; the "job search visa" is valid for up to a maximum of 1 year. If the student finds a job they have to apply for a work permit and Residence Permit on the basis of the job/internship itself.

## UK 'Work Opportunities' for International Students on Student Visas

This information cannot be guaranteed. Please check with the appropriate country consulate.

- **Students from non EU countries:** Full-time Students who have a full UK student visa (not stamped 'Work Prohibited') are allowed to work 20 hours per week during term time and unlimited hours during breaks. When applying for their student visa they must show sufficient funds to pay for their tuition fees and personal expenses without resorting to any income they might expect to earn while they are in the UK. The student needs to apply for a residence card in order to work once in the country.
- **Students studying for 6 months or less:** Students must apply for a 'UK Student Visitors Visa' at the UK point of entry and are not allowed to work.
- **After graduation:** Students can not stay and work in the country.
- **Students from EU countries:** Students from the EU countries are allowed to work on any type or amount of work with no restrictions.
- **Students from EEA countries (Bulgaria and Romania):** Students are allowed to work 20 hours per week during term-time and they may work unlimited hours during the breaks, but they first have to apply for a Registration Certificate.

# Madrid, Spain – Campus, Destination, Visas, Cost of Living, Working

The Madrid Campus puts you at the cultural epicenter of the Spanish-speaking world, where the traditional meets the modern on a grand scale. ## Spain ‘Work Opportunities’ for International Students on Student Visas

This information cannot be guaranteed. Please check with the appropriate country consulate.

- **Students from non EU countries:** Student visas do NOT permit students to legally work while in Spain. They can have an unpaid internship. Some exceptions are made through a 7 month work and residence permit process. Once students have graduated they can stay until their visa expires.
- **Students from EU countries:** Students do not need a Work and a Residence permit in order to work in Spain. They are allowed to work with no restrictions.

## Is the on-line program provided through the Schiller Florida campus?

Yes, the Schiller online program is based in and provided by our Largo, Florida campus via eCollege.

## In a nutshell, what is the value of an online program?

## How does the online student receive and hand in assignments?

In the online classroom, electronically in the course drop boxes, thru document sharing.

## How does the online student interact with his/her instructor and peers?

Via email, threaded discussion, chat

**How will the online student be graded?** - Weekly grades are given.

**What time are classes held?** - 24 hours Asynchronous. The online student can sign in or out at will.

**How much time should the online student reserve?** - 15 to 20 hours per week.

**Do classes have specific start and end dates?** - Yes.

**How long will it take to complete a degree program?**

Depends on you can double up as long as you maintenance GPA and financial commitments.

**How will the online student know which classes to take?**

The student will be assigned an advisor by Schiller who will provide this information.

**How and when does the online student enroll in online courses?**

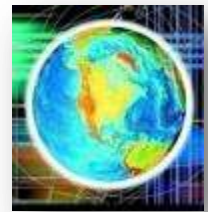
Every term the student enrolls in 4 classes at a time. The courses are assigned.

## France ‘Work Opportunities’ for International Students on Student Visas

This information cannot be guaranteed. Please check with the appropriate country consulate.

- **Students from non EU countries:** Students may work in France around 20 hours a week with a visa or ‘carte de séjour’ (student or residency permit) residency permit.
- **Students from EU countries:** Students do not need a visa or work permit, to live, work and study in France; with the exception of the new added members who will need a work permit.
- **After graduation:** Students with a ‘carte de séjour’ may stay in Paris as long as his student permit allows him. Jobs are only available if they are jobs a French person cannot do. Companies can apply for a ‘carte de séjour’.

# Schiller International Student Enrollment Process via our Partner Agents

- 4 Passport size photographs

### **STEP 3: You and your Agent will receive an electronic copy of your Acceptance Letter**

- Upon receipt of your electronic copy of your Acceptance Letter:
  - Provide any additional documents requested
  - Pay the requested deposit s as per the campus of choice

### **STEP 4: Work with your Partner Agent to identify the unique student visa requirements for your chosen campus country**

- Identify any individual student visa requirements
- Obtain any required student visa
- Keep your Schiller Partner Agent up to date on your student visa status at all times

### **STEP 5: Housing and Travel arrangements**

- Your Schiller Partner Agent will work with Schiller to provide you with your housing options
- Book and pay any deposits required to secure your housing
- Book your travel

### **STEP 6: Payment**

- Work with your Schiller Partner Agent to ensure the appropriate payment is made to Schiller 14 days prior to your arrival on campus
